September 1976--The mountain meeting went well even though we didn't have as big a turnout as we had hoped for. Unfortunately, Sunday morning was cold and raining, and people were afraid of getting stuck in the campground.... The local newspaper did a full-page article with photos (printed in such a way as to make individuals not recognizable) which gave an honest presentation of Paganism.

December 1976--We needed a large statue for our outdoor Circle of the God. However, as you know, you can't find them at the corner store... or anywhere else. So, the only solution was to make our own. The basic idea came from Sefa. The God statue is a four-foot statue of David. Holes are drilled in the head, the antlers trimmed to size, then a nail put halfway into the antler, and the other half into the small hole in the head. After inserting this into the head, the large hole around the antler base is filled with glue, putty, etc. The hooves are real cattle hooves which may be purchased from a meat processing company. These may be soaked in ammonia for several days, or treated in some other manner for curing. After they are dried, they may be cut with a hacksaw to the proper size. Plaster or other material may be used to secure them to the statue after the front part of the statue feet are sawed off. To make a horned helmet, we used a worker's hardhat, drilled holes in the sides, and holes in the antlers. These were attached with molly bolts and washers on both inside and outside of the hat. Remainder of the helmet is covered with pieces of rabbit fur which have been cut and attached with glue.

June 1977--The May (1977) issue of National Geographic offered rolled paper maps of the Celtic World at \$2. Plastic are \$3. (For current prices, write POB 2895, Washington, DC 20013).

July 1977--As you know, we have a number of outdoor statues here. Stone is too expensive and hard to find. Plaster does not hold up too well in the weather even though painted with enamel. We have found the solution is polyurethane enamel. First coat thinned and second coat just as it comes from the can. It gives a hard, glass-like finish.

August 1977--Answer to a question: Why the "Of Bakersfield" in our name when we have members all over the country? Because when we started with our first charter we had not heard of any other "Church Of Wicca". But then they started

popping up all over the place. So we added the "Of Bakersfield" to make it clear that we are not and never have been associated with any other "Church Of Wicca".... This is your newsletter. It operates on donations, and on your keeping us informed of what's happening. If you don't tell us, we can't tell others. If we don't hear from you, we can only assume you are not interested.

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Learning Tarot by jeannie

Most instructional material for learning Tarot, or other methods of divination using cards or such as a medium, rely on the student to absorb the individual meanings of the symbols and of the cards prior to ever "throwing" (dealing the cards in a specific pattern). I would like to propose an alternative method, probably not a new one for there really isn't much new under the sun.

In the beginning, it is important to remember that you will only be reading for yourself. When you have more confidence in working with the cards and their meanings, you will be ready to read for others. If you have difficulty reading for yourself, try to read for someone who is experienced with Tarot or who thoroughly understands that you are undergoing a learning process as the primary purpose of the reading. After all, you wouldn't want surgeons to make their first pass with a scalpel over your skin, would you?

Before You Begin: Read the directions. This may sound dumb, but I've seen folks read Cartouche in a Celtic spread just starting out. While this is fine and dandy, and we'll talk about variations later on, in the beginning, stick with the primary layout recommended in the guidebook for that particular deck. Read all of the directions before you even think about throwing the cards.

The tools you will need are simple. You will need a deck of cards, any deck will do, preferably a deck you like and one for which an interpretive guide and directions for throwing are readily available. You will also need a notebook and the guidebook mentioned above. The only other needs are space and time: space to throw the cards; time to work with them. For the initial exercise, you'll need about two to three hours.

Begin by studying the diagram for the spread given by the guidebook carefully, even before you remove the cards from their container. You may want to copy the diagram inside the cover of your notebook or use liquid (or needle for the ambitious) embroidery to copy the diagram to scale on a piece of cloth on which you will later throw the cards.

Some guidebooks will give you specific directions for handling the cards as part of the initial instructions. Obviously, they should be handled with care. You may find a simple purification rite to perform prior to reading the cards. This, too, you may want to record inside the cover of your notebook above the diagram. In the beginning, no one should handle the cards but you. Later, when you read for others, the querent should handle the cards only to shuffle them. In general, treat the cards with the same respect as any other divination object.

Take a minute or two to look at each of the cards. If there are particular cards which appeal to you, make note of this in your notebook. Then, hold the cards face down in your hands and concentrate on one question you would like to ask. If you do not have a specific question, blank your mind or ask that you be told what you need to know. (The first time I threw the Witches' Tarot, I was told I needed to study it more!) Then, if the directions for throwing the cards indicate the selection of a Significator, remove this card from the deck and place it in front of you according to the diagram. Shuffle the cards in accordance with the directions in the guidebook. Then throw the cards.

Once the cards are thrown, you will be working from the cards thrown, the guidebook, and your notebook. In your notebook, write the day, the name of the deck, the time of day, and the question asked. Then, for each card in the throw, in the order thrown, record the following information in your notebook:

1. The position of the card in the throw and the significance of the position of the card in the throw as given by the guidebook.
2. The card that appears in that position and whether the card is upright or reversed.
3. The meanings of the card as given by the guidebook.

At this point, you have a complete record of the possible interpretations of the reading and, if you don't already have an advanced case of writer's cramp, you may want to comment on what in the reading applies to your current situation and what doesn't. If absolutely nothing makes sense or fits together, it is most likely because you were not concentrating on your question completely. If this is the case, start over. If it happens more than twice, try again at another time.

Next, stack the cards in the reading face up with the outcome card on the bottom of the stack. The order of the rest of the cards does not matter. Keep these cards separate from the rest of the deck and put the unused portion of the deck away. Do not retain cards with negative connotations. Either invert the card to a more favorable position or return the card to the unused portion of the deck. This completes the first session with the cards.

On a daily basis, go back to your notebook and, selecting the card on top of the pile retained from the reading, record the following information:

1. The date.
2. The card selected from the top of the pile.
3. The position of the card in the original throw and the significance of the position of the card.
4. The interpretations of the card from the guidebook.
5. The interpretations of the card as they applied to you when you did the reading.
6. The interpretations of the card as they apply to your present situation.

You will find that the interpretations as applied to your situation may change from the reading to the daily meditation, but usually the two meanings will be closely related. Do this for each card, but only for one card per day. The last daily meditation will be on the outcome card. At this point, you may want to make some notes on each card in the reading, what it meant to you when you first threw the cards and what it means to you now.

After you have completed the daily meditation on the outcome card, you are ready to throw the cards again. Proceed in the same manner and record the same information on the second throw. Again, retain the cards from the throw as you did in

the first reading. During your daily meditations, however, check back to see whether the card appeared in the first reading. If so, make note also of the position and meanings of the card in the first reading as well as the daily notes on the card from the second reading. You will find that, when cards reappear in a second reading, some meaning and relation carries over from the first reading.

This recording system can be used for readings for others with a few modifications:

1. When you read for others, explain briefly the recording techniques and ask if you may do this.
2. Keep these records separate from your personal records, preferably in a loose leaf notebook. If the querent so desires, you may give the record to them to keep for reference.
3. Always maintain the confidentiality of the querent. The loose leaf notebook allows you to add pages and remove them, helping you maintain confidentiality and availability of records for both you and the querent. This notebook should be maintained so that no one has access to the complete notebook except you.

As far as the reading itself, there are a few minor modifications. If a Significator is selected prior to the throw, select the Significator before the cards are surrendered to the querent. Instruct the querent to hold the cards face down and meditate on a specific question. Before surrendering the cards, instruct the querent in how to shuffle the cards. Once the querent has shuffled the cards and returned them to you, throw the cards, facing you. As you are making your notes, explain to the querent each of the items you are recording: the position of the card, the significance of the position, the card appearing in the position, the possible interpretations of the card, if the card appeared in a previous reading for this querent. When you have done this for each card, you may want to offer some overall interpretations for the reading. It is not important that you know the question the querent asked as long as the querent received valuable information from the reading. You don't always get what you want, but you always get what you need.

Obviously, you do not give cards from the reading to the querent to take home. However, on their copy of the record, you may want to circle selected cards and suggest the same daily meditation techniques. The cards themselves should be returned to the unused portion of the deck and the deck shuffled before returning the cards to storage.

Experimentation with variations in layout and technique are carried out with similar recording efforts. Always start by experimenting with readings for yourself first and flag your notes (with an asterisk, *, perhaps) where variations take place. Include in your daily meditations whether the variation was beneficial. If so, it may be a technique you can use for querents; however, it should be noted that variations that work for you may not work for querents. This, too, should be noted.

The benefits of this method of learning tarot are manifold. First, it allows the student to proceed directly to throwing the cards without the necessity of knowing anything about the individual cards. Second, it provides a reference point (the notebook) from which the student may readily monitor both knowledge of the cards and personal spiritual progress. Third, it provides a self-paced program for learning tarot with virtually no need of instructor supervision or intervention and a self-perpetuating mechanism for feedback. It also provides a recording mechanism which can be used for querents so that they leave the reading with "hardcopy" for future reference.

For those of you with computers and data base capability, some of the writer's cramp can be mitigated with a couple of heavy duty sessions at the keyboard. To set up the data base, the key field will be a unique identifier for each upright and reversed meaning of each of the cards. KC, for example, might be the key field for King of Cups while KCR might be the key field for the same card reversed. Subsequent fields contain the meaning of the card as given by the guidebook. If you have character limitations on record size, you can abbreviate to key words or, if you have multiple base capacity, reference to another data base. Be sure to leave ample room for additional interpretations from other guidebooks or your own notes. Your report format is provided from the card layout with the data base of interpretations acting as the variables for the report. You may even want to experiment with a program to throw the cards

using random number generating techniques. This, however, should be done only once you feel very comfortable with the standard methods of the deck you are using and, of course, are intimate with your software. Once the data base is entered, variations can be programmed, incorporated into the report, or added to the data base.

By dedicating that land to the Earth and consecrating that land as divine we help Earth and all our relations heal that land. A city can seem to be distorted,

disturbed energy. An individual or group can transform an entire city into a Magickal land. Again. In all nows.

On August 17, 1987, MER laid a medicine wheel made of medicine wheels around Birmingham measuring 8,000 feet across. We made Birmingham "a place of compacting power" for healing the Earth and Her Peoples. We know we now live in a truly sacred Magickal land. Though it is early to see results, we have noticed more grass roots political, social, and environmental activism happening in Birmingham and Alabama.

We encourage any person or group to bless the Earth. Here is the ritual we used:

Obtain a map of the area and a highlighter pen.

Draw your symbol on the map. We used our home as the center. Use any symbol which means healing to you. A pentacle, an ankh, the Earth symbol, a medicine wheel, a Celtic stone circle, or whatever feels right.

Decide where the "beginning" of the symbol is. For example, since our home was the center of the medicine wheel, we created our home as a "mother stone" of the medicine wheel.

List the street locations of where the symbol falls on the map. Or list where the four quarters and center of your symbol are.

Choose a time to consecrate the area. You may wish to visit the site prior to the actual time of the ceremony. By previously checking each site we were able to find safe, legal, public land.

"Every year," said Grandfather. "They run amuck; I let them. Pride of lions in the yard. Stare, and they burn a hole in your retina. A common flower, a weed that no one sees, yes. But for Us a Noble thing, the dandelion." --Ray Bradbury from Dandelion Wine

At this time of year some of us have beautiful green lawns, some of us don't. Some of us have beautiful green lawns dotted with little bright yellow flowers. This can add to or detract from the beauty of your acreage according to your point of view.

Someone once told me that if I wanted to get rid of something, to let it know that I was going to eat it. So, if you would like a dandelion-free yard, the following recipes may be posted hither and yon around the offenders so they get the idea. It may work.

On the other hand, putting to good use what The Mother offers is one of the sincerest forms of appreciation. With that, I offer a slightly closer look at a plant we generally overlook.

There are several species of dandelion native to the United States, all having similar qualities. For our purposes, we are spotlighting *Taraxacum officinale*, originally native to the Old World, now flourishing all over the New one wherever there is enough moisture. Dandelion is the English corruption of the French dent de lion or lion's tooth. Other common or folk names are Blowball, Cankerwort, Piss-a-bed, Priest's Crown, Puffball, Swine Snout, White Endive, and Wild Endive.

The dandelion is one of the most versatile and useful plants known. The leaves may be eaten raw or cooked. If they are a little bitter, they may be boiled more than once, changing the water in between. However, the greens contain large quantities of vitamins A and C and are rich in B vitamins and you may be pouring out some of those nutrients with the water.

Picked young, the leaves can be eaten in salads or on sandwiches. If you just happen to have your very own silkworm helping you make your very own silk things, it can eat dandelion leaves when you run out of mulberry leaves. Won't that save you a trip to the store.

The roots may be used in making tea or dried, ground, and used to make a sort of coffee substitute.

Surprise your dinner guests with dandelion flowers dipped in batter and fried in butter. The perfect vegetable accompaniment to that perfect main dish. Flowers can also be sauteed, candied, made into jelly, and wine.

The roots and leaves of the plant are diuretic, aperient, hepatic, and are used for cleansing the urinary tract, the liver, gall bladder, kidney and stomach. The tea is a good all-around tonic and is said to be good for hypochondria, fevers, and rheumatism. The distilled waters of the dandelion are also good for washing the sores of the skin.

To get rid of warts, apply the juice of the stem for at least three consecutive days. Allow the juice to dry after each application.

Dandelion is a masculine plant. Its planet is Jupiter. Its deity is Hecate and its element is Air.

It is used in calling spirits, divination, and, as every child knows, to make wishes.

To call spirits, make dandelion tea, call spirits as usual and watch for them to materialize in the steam of the tea.

Divination is done in the same manner as wishmaking. By blowing on the seed head one may divine the answer to one's question. Number questions seem to be best here.

Drinking the dandelion coffee substitute mentioned earlier is said to enhance psychic powers. Might as well check and see.

We are given so much in our lives. With every mouthful and every sip I am reminded of the Goddess and just how much I have. Enjoy.

Dandelion Jelly: this jelly looks and tastes like honey. Gather one quart of blossoms early in the morning. The honey content is higher at that time. Wash them well and add one quart of water to the blossoms. Boil hard for five minutes; then drain through cloth so the liquid is clear. Measure three cups of liquid, combine with one teaspoon lemon juice,

one package of Sure-Jell and four and one-half cups of sugar. Boil until it reaches the gel point: Pour into jars and seal.

Dandelion Wine: I think there are as many recipes for dandelion wine as there are people who make it. This recipe is from Bruce Palmer's Wine-making at Home and I chose it primarily for its simplicity. If you are interested in learning more, there is another easy, step-by-step recipe in Super-Easy Step-By-Step Winemaking by Yvonne Young Tarr. Both books are fun to read, easy to follow, and seem to be written for those of us of beginner status.

Pick five gallons of dandelion blossoms. Remove all of the stems. Put them into a ten-gallon crock, pressing them down firmly. Add five gallons of boiling water. Let the blossoms steep for about fifteen minutes. Bail the flowers into a clean, strong, unstarched cloth bag and press well in two batches to get all the juice and color. Pour the juice back into the crock. Add half a cake of pressed yeast or half an envelope of dry yeast, stirring well. Stir in twenty pounds of sugar and one quart of inexpensive brandy. Allow to ferment for seven days. Skim the surface and strain through cheesecloth into a five-gallon distilled water bottle. Let stand overnight, then water seal. A water seal is available through merchants catering to the winemaking trade. This wine should not require racking. As soon as it is clear, wait another week, just to be sure, then bottle and cork it. This is a wine to drink young since it is not likely to improve much with age. The brandy ensures its durability and fortifies its strength.

Pour the finished product into a clear glass and hold it to the light. Peer through the pale gold liquid and remember pretty yellow flowers and a bright summer day.

Just wait until they have to contend with the children of Allah. The Muslims are the largest monotheistic sect currently and they have the greatest rate of numerical growth. The Central

Intelligence Agency tracks their population patterns. If it bothers you that some bubblegum-minded Christian fundamentalists are not willing to "... suffer a Witch to live..." hold on until you find out what those saber-rattling -religion-and-government-all-rolled-into-One, Allah Xtians have in store for anyone who sees differently from them. They call them Infidels and they don't like them - A LOT! But then, I've encountered some people who claim to be Witches and are monotheists. It's all the same though, monotheism does not work. It is inherently flawed as a belief system. It is a fairly new idea as far as religious ideas go, but its faults are more than can be accounted for by undeveloped youth.

The Middle East is a prime case in point. Joseph Campbell, author of The Hero With A Thousand Faces, points to the region as an example of the failure of modern myth. Here we have three monotheist cults ready to push each other into the sea because they all believe there can only be one God and He can only have one name.

Then there is the real thorn; Evil. If there is only one diety and that diety is all that is good and right and proper. And if that diety made everything and is stronger than anything, then how can things fail to be always good and right and proper. Why is there evil, suffering, chaos? Well, you see, here the monotheist has to tap dance a little; then he comes up with: drum roll, shudder: the Devil. This guy accounts for everything that goes wrong. Diety can not banish him, or at least has not been able to so far. Indeed, to hear the fundies of any Xtian persuasion tell it, the Devil and his infidel cohorts are always about to take over if there is any less sword rattling from the ranks of the faithful. At the same time this everlasting, undefeatable adversary is not a God. The logical problems should be almost self-evident. The philisophical issues are a little more subtle. They account for a lot of the confusion and frustration many an Xtian lives with, though they themselves seldom realize it. How would you feel if your God had been fighting all Its life, showed no sign of imminent victory, and it was not even a god that was giving God such a good fight?

But no Witch should ever have to carry such psychomylthical garbage about with them. That should seem to go without saying. I would like to think most 'Craft traditions harken from a perspective which sees beyond the petty rising and falling of empires. 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Reply to Neophyte Ethics by Luinrandir Harnsen

While I will not judge or debate the events in the letter by Marguerite, I do wish to relay my thoughts on two of the three concepts:

Do as you will, and harm none. This statement is perhaps one of the most terrible of them all. For the untrained (or not practiced enough), this statement is one habit that will change as training progresses. For myself, it is a Zen concept. If you intend no ill and knowingly put events in a proper order, then this statement has been carried out. It would seem that the order of "A's" events shows that he did as he thought best, although things didn't turn out as he planned. He may have even had an accident if he had left on time. (But we all know that second guessing the fates is pointless). So to this I suggest that A should meditate upon this event so (s)he will be better attuned to these situations in the future. And for the teachers of groups I suggest a sign on the door saying, "This Door Sealed" meaning simply "Do Not Disturb".

I remember one time that I was late for a sabbat. Looking back on it now, I could have done things differently and been there on time. While I am glad that Pap found my comments "delightful", it would seem that the entire content of the article/letter sailed right over his/her head!

First, as to "the only defense a Witch should require is the example of the life led by the individual Witch"... how naive can one person be!

I get so bored with people saying, "We set the example by the life we led", when no one knows what you bloody are, nitwit! The twits that go around with this pabulum on their lips are the same bloody fools who hide their Craft away, putting on the pretend xian act and playing it to the hilt, and would not wear a pentagram in public if their lives depended on it (and someday it may!).

Moonstone and I had a dear Witch friend who lived a few miles from our Covenstead and felt this way... she was always telling us how she set an example for all to see by the life she led. Oh, if you are wondering about me, yes, I let my life speak for me as well, and am very active in raising money for many local causes, and also make regular visits to the children's wards of the hospitals in the area to cheer up the kids with a few magic tricks and origami, and it is well known that I never turn down a request from a worthwhile cause... when the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in nearby Kokomo needed money for a day care center, I was asked to do a magic show as a fundraiser for them. I did, and my "stage" turned out to be the large altar area. Pentagrams and all, I was made welcome and even put the pastor on the floor laughing when midway through the show I wheeled out a giant guillotine and announced that Pastor Muhl had asked me to say a few words about the woes of not attending church regularly. (In case you wonder, yes, I later chopped off my wife's head with the thing... but fear not, I put it back... eventually!).

And yes, I always wear my pentagrams (a silver eye one, the Merlin Pentagram I designed, now marketed by Magi Craftsmen back East--two silver pentagram rings), an antique Celtic Priestess' ring which happens to fit, and of course my two bone and coyote teeth necklaces that were given to me when I was made Shaman of the local Native American tribes... and my leather spell pouch and an Athame are always on my belt, who's buckle is in an antique image of the great God Woton... so I would hazard that most folks have at least a general idea what religion I belong to.

Now, as to speaking out for my religion. Well, dear old Pap may feel like standing around shuffling feet when the fundies get on the news telling how we (Witches in general) practice devil worship, ritual child abuse, sacrifices of animals and even humans, and all the other bs... but I sure as hell won't... I speak out myself. After all, when you talk about Witchcraft in this area, like it or not, most non-Witches think of us... and so does the media, so when a fundie gets on his high horse, more than likely the media will come to me to see if I'll knock him off it.

Now, it may offend Pap's senses, but when a reporter asks, "Do Witches practice weird sex rites and devil worship?", I feel like saying no for all of us. And, what impression would it leave if to that question I said that no, our Coven did not but I can't speak for others? You can bet the farm that the next day the headlines would read, "Merlin says Some Witches are Devil Worshipers".

But, I have to be fair, so the very next time a reporter asks me if we practice ritual child abuse, I'll say, "No, we do not, and neither do most Witches we know... but there is one named Pap who I really can't say does not practice ritual child abuse"... How about that Pap, okay with you? I sure don't want to step on your toes and will say exactly the above unless you give me permission to include you with all the rest of us who do not practice ritual child abuse. (And if you think I'm kidding, you sure don't know old Merlin The Enchanter very well.)

Now, while no one can ever speak for the Craft as a whole, some folks have to speak up for our views, and even if Pap is too ignorant to realize it, we do have a lot that is general among us... and it has always been that way, one person's Craft is at its heart not that different from another's.

And, while a study of generalities is not worthwhile, some of us have studied many systems in depth and know and can work many systems... Ray Buckland comes right to mind in this light.

As for my own background, my main focus is the Gardner teaching and I am a third degree Gardnerian. I am also Shaman of the local tribes and am recognized as a Shaman by the Southeastern Cherokee Confederacy of the Cherokee Nations. (Being one half Native American, I see no drawback to honoring both sides of my Spiritual self as long as the Ways are not blended into some silly Wiccan-Shamanism that honors neither).

Aside from that, I have personally traveled to some 138 different foreign countries (so far), lectured at 80 major universities around the world, and spent most of the first half of my life living all over the world with native tribes and Magickal people. In Europe, I visited and stayed with every local Witch, Wizard, psychic, healer, reader and the like I heard of and could track down, from staying with old Gerald Gardner at his cottage on the Isle of Man, to spending several days at the home of an old Crone in Italy who taught me so many spells and workings of her Craft that it filled 56 cassette tapes! (My written and recorded interviews with all these people fill some 15,000 pages and some 943 cassette and reel-to-reel tapes). I have lived for weeks on the plains of South Africa with the Bushman Medicine Men swapping my

magickal knowledge for theirs... and did the same with native tribes in our own country, Australia, the South Seas, and the Amazon Delta. I lived for eighteen months with a young Voodoo Priestess, sharing her room and her knowledge to the extent that her followers began calling me "The White Witchdoctor".

My museum library contains the largest collection of handwritten Book Of Shadows (all original, not copies, and most 100 to 200 years old) in the world... and yes, I have read every one of the over 1,000 books in my Craft library (which is why I am usually seen lugging a book with me whenever I travel).

My dear old dad raised me with one saying always in mind, "Money talks, bullshit walks." So when two years ago the Grand Magister of the second oldest Satanic Order in North America offered to sell me all their Ritual Chamber effects, Altar Tools, Library, private records, Robes, Capes, and the whole ball of wax, I shelled out for it for my museum... Seth even made a special presentation to me of a certificate making me the new fifth degree (highest) Grand Magister of the Order, just in case I wanted to start it up again (actually I did, as a purely Ceremonial Magick/non-Satanic Order).

Now, before you run off into hysterics, Gerald Gardner had a large display of Satanic/Black Magick items in his museum on the Isle of Man (and in my collection is a copy of his guidebook to prove that)... Raymond Buckland had a display of the same in his museum on Long Island (and I have his guidebook he gave me to prove that too)... and my reason for wanting it was the same as theirs, to be able to study the beliefs of the system and to display their items so that folks at the museum can compare them and see how we differ. I am interested in truth, not in silly fears and mindless dogma that says one person cannot study the ways of another.

Besides, having the Satanic collection gives great weight to my statement that they differ greatly from Witches... folks can see that I know what I am talking about, and if you question me, I can talk in great and precise detail of the Satanic collection I own (including their handwritten Book Of Shadows), the only copies that exist and many even came with

death curses attached for any who reveal them (golly gee Batman).

The point is, I am not some twit fresh out of the cabbage patch and when I speak of the generalities of the Craft, I speak of those practices we all share (except for Pap, who may or may not practice ritual child abuse)... one may now hope that certain folks will understand what one means by "the Craft in general".

And, speaking of what we all share, it has never failed to amaze me at how the ancient people all over the world shared the same Magickal beliefs, even down to some of the very same symbols and tools.

For example, let's take the Hag or Holed (Holly) Stone around my neck I always wear (it has never been taken off once in the past many years)... a very beautiful Holed Stone that was unearthed during an archeological dig at Stonehenge in England. It was found with several other items under and near the Altar Stone during a Victorian dig there. In a display case just across the room from where I sit typing this are two more Holed Stones, one for the burial mound of a Holly Man of the people known as Mound Builders and the other from a grave of the prehistoric race known as the "Red Paint People". Next to that showcase is another, and in it is a Holed Stone that Raymond Buckland found many yars ago on the beaches of the Isle of Man while he was visiting old GBG, and which Ray wore for many eyars around his neck, and later gave to me along with his very first Tarot deck and some other goodies.

The stone from Stonehenge that I wear and the two from the ancient North American peoples (the Red Paint stone, which, by the way, has a fossil in it as well and so was a great treasure to its owner. It was found on the Northeastern shores of Canada and the mound builder stone came from a dig in Ohio) all showed signs of having been hung on cords, just as Ray and I wear (in Ray's case, wore) ours. Druid, Shaman and Medicine Man all used them for the same things (powerful protection and healing). I have also seen tribal Medicine Men in Africa and Australia wearing them and using them for the same things.

So, don't tell me we are all so very different. Small minds look for the differences and great ones look for the truth, a great man once said (actually, I think it was me). In any event, all the above is no brag, just fact, and so perhaps Pap will feel better, or perhaps not, about my speaking out on behalf of the Craft in general, now that he/she knows something of my own background... and if any of the things I have said are doubted, you are welcome to visit the museum where on display to the public at large are the proofs of everything I say, and if you doubt it and don't have the guts to visit the museum, well that would be your problem and not mine.

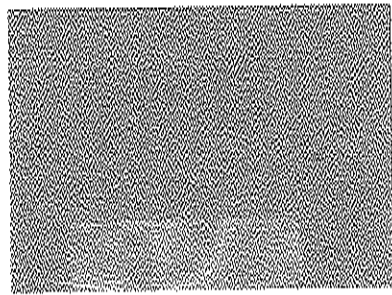
