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From Fags to Witches by Dr. Leo Louis Martello

In the June '89 GNL, Runaristi seemed to call me to task for defending Lady Sabrina when Merlin denounced her because a teenage boy bought her courses and then misrepresented the Craft, holding her to blame. When I wrote what I did, it was on the information I had at hand and concerned ONLY this one issue. My saying Lady S. "would not only be vindicated, but blessed by the Goddess" was not a moral blank check, and did not concern any other issues, known and unknown. Even if she was Lady Shiteater and had defamed me, I still would have taken the stand I did then.

My question to Runaristi is: When Lady Sabrina made all those ugly defamatory statements about Lady Genevieve (Joyce Siegrist), Ann Forfreedom, and White Light Pentacles' owners, and myself, what did YOU say or do? Just sit in silence? Let it pass? Even now, what you wrote is NOT under your own name (as is my reply) but a Craft one. Would you be willing to send me a signed letter in your own name stating all the things you did? The Witches Anti-Defamation League is primarily concerned with defending the Craft against bigoted cowans but it is NOT limited to that. If you want to see more than a change of my then opinion about Lady S., you have to do your part, since seemingly you have firsthand experience and I cannot act without PROOF. The ball is yours.

I don't know who Runaristi is but I can easily find out. What I want to know is: Will she (he?) be willing to back up these statements, naming time and places, and, if possible, witnesses? In the past, I've gotten letters from people saying how outraged they were over attacks made on me at public lectures but when I asked them, "What did you do?" I never heard from them again. I hope this is not a repeat of the same thing. As to my "feelings" about Lady S., at the time I wrote in her defense, I didn't have any. I didn't know her. As I've pointed out so many times, I am issue oriented, not concerned with personality disputes. As to any "change" in my "feelings": I've been accumulating a great deal of data from all over, from many sources, and there are certain things that, if finally proved, could result in Federal charges and a loss of any legal status. One example: Using the mails to send obnoxious, anonymous, harassing letters or cards across state lines. Comparison of past typewritten and handwritten letters (forensic graphology) can easily prove if from the same hand or machine.

I hope that I'm not being used to "get back" at Lady S. when Runaristi, from what she wrote, is in so much better a position. If everything said about Lady S. is true, there is still something much worse: Those who DO NOTHING ABOUT IT. "Letting Leo do it" does not absolve one's own moral responsibility. In the past, I've seen so many moral amoebas and gutless guppies, those who hide behind Craft names to attack others, whose statements, even when true, lack moral conviction because they themselves mask their true identities, refuse to "get involved" unless safely behind an alias, and don't realize that they are either a part of the problem or part of the solution.

I've been called worse than a "funky little fag". That made me laugh, in spite of its sexism. In 1969 three national movements began in this country: Women's Liberation, Gay Liberation, and Witches Liberation. I was involved in all three. In a 1969 issue of Time Magazine, there's a photo of me in front of the United Nations, holding a big sign, "Keep the Government Out of Our Bedrooms". I was the inspiration for Arthur Evans' book, Witchcraft and the Gay Counterculture (see page 170 under "Acknowledgements" in which Evans wrote, "Leo Martello, friend and witch, who first suggested to me in 1970 that there was a link between witchcraft and the history of feminism.") The early Craft magazine, The Waxing Moon, had a statement in 1970 that "the craft has no need for women's liberation". Indeed! And many of the "Craft leaders" in 1970 were anti-gay, notably Ray Buckland, who later changed his views in an article in the Earth Religion News. Being "gay" or "straight" says absolutely nothing about the moral character of a person, merely the sexual orientation. I know for a fact that one of Lady S's "best friends" (who knows for how long?) is not only gay but has been involved in illegal harassment of Lady Genevieve, tape recorded on her telephone machine. Since she is also Occult Advisor to the Cranston, RI Police Department, they told her what to do.

Let's look at some of the people Runaristi claims Lady S. has defamed: Joyce Siegrist, Lady Genevieve, HPs of Rosegate, Our Lady of the Roses Wiccan Church, publisher Rosegate Journal--you have to be living in Siberia not to have seen all the media attention she got in virtually every major newspaper in the country when she won tax-exempt status from the state of Rhode Island, after being refused, backed by the

American Civil Liberties Union. Write-ups on the front page of most RI newspapers, many TV and radio shows, including Canada, England, Australia, Germany, etc. Appearances on a new TV game show. "Third Degree", Boston's TV-4 "Evening Magazine", Newsweek, too many to mention. And, of course, she's Director of New England Witches Anti-Defamation League.

Ann Forfreedom, Director California WADL: hardly a week passes that she doesn't get a letter published in one of the SF Bay area newspapers defending the Craft.

Merlin the Enchanter is now Director of the Indiana WADL.

I have never permitted any racist or sexist statements in my presence. ~~Rosegate~~ knows this very well when, the same evening in which Runaristi says Lady S. was "viciously mocking Lady Genevieve behind her back" she was accompanied by the same gay friend suspected of harassing her on the telephone. Some Rosegate members, in their anger and disgust, made seemingly anti-gay remarks. Under the circumstances, understandable, but not justified. They should have been anti- that person. When another friend called this to my attention, I immediately questioned all involved. The true facts were discovered and the situation resolved.

The alternative to my saying, "Lady Sabrina will be vindicated and blessed by the Goddess" is that she would be damned by the Goddess. The former may or may not be true but the latter is NOT true. We all damn ourselves. If Lady S. is guilty of the Runaristi charges, she has already damned herself. If Runaristi wants to back up her statements in a court of law, the owners of White Light Pentacles can sue Lady S. for all she's worth for saying "they sell drugs". If I could prove someone said that about me, you can be damn sure that I'd sue them and put them out of business. As I've said before, it's up to Runaristi to put up or shut up.

Ed note: There was also a letter from Lady Sabrina which I am more or less, happy to see. I wish she had written us a letter but that wish is fairly pointless. Other correspondence from her has neither been of a personal nature nor did it address the issues raised by some of our readers. Unfortunately I have misplaced her letter, but will be happy

to print such should she send another copy or another letter. I have no idea who Runaristi is. I don't know Lady Sabrina, either. Publishing Runaristi's letter was done without malice toward Lady Sabrina on the part of the GNL or GC (see disclaimer on page one or the continuation thereof), as was publication of Merlin's letter, as was publication of Dr. Martello's letter, and to think otherwise is to assume we operate at cross purposes to a basic tenet of our belief system. When a letter comes in like this, we publish it and refutations thereof, mainly to allow a "clearing of the air". It is hoped that our readers are intelligent enough to discriminate that such letters represent opinion, usually only one, and the letters are published in that light.

Please try to remember that there are some questionable elements out there who try to associate themselves with Witchcraft as we know it. We count on our readers to send us information and their opinions. If we refuse to publish anything, negative or otherwise, about anyone or anything because it might get us sued, who will know? Who will have information on which to base their decisions? I think it's better to just go ahead and get such opinion out in the open, deal with it, and get on to more productive things. We don't make judgement calls here (at least not in the GNL, maybe in the confines of the living room over coffee between me and the Philosophy Editor which is certainly no one else's business) unless we have first-hand facts or other solid information which, in this case, we do not. All we have is hearsay which we have published for the sake of letting people clear their own names or letting others do the clearing who do have first-hand knowledge or contributory information. To do otherwise is either to deprive readers of information or to allow a misunderstanding to grow (which, in my experience, they do, on an exponential basis).

So far, to me, this case is beginning to sound like one giant personality conflict. This ain't the place for it. Here's how you can resolve a personality conflict. First, you can go your own way and just leave it alone. If you feel that you must do something, contact the offending party personally. (You know if it gets published here, it will get back to them--isn't that what you're hoping?--and common courtesy, even in the COWAN realm, would indicate at least sending a copy to them so they have a chance to refute in a timely manner. This should be the case, even if you are

presenting the information for the "public good".) This does not appear to have happened in Runaristi's case which, in my opinion, says something of the source. Giving Runaristi the benefit of the doubt, it could have been sent here without a copy to Lady Sabrina and Dr. Martello because Runaristi had no other method of contacting them. If Runaristi's accusations are true, it's plain that at least one reader would like some additional FACTS and supporting evidence from Runaristi. Please don't send it to me unless you have already sent a copy to the people in question or it will go to File Thirteen. (Write Dr. Martello at 153 W 80th ST Suite 1B, NY, NY 10024.)

I will be happy to publish a letter from Lady Sabrina or anyone else mentioned in Runaristi's letter refuting the statements by Runaristi or otherwise providing comment. My suggestion is that Runaristi contact Lady Sabrina directly, or vice versa, work it out, and let us know what happens. Love and trust, folks, remember?

Now, for you folks who have so kindly pointed out that this could subject us to lawsuit, we are aware that anyone can do this at any time regardless of the plausibility of their plea. All it takes is one hungry lawyer and one person with a monkey on their back. But what GOOD would it do? Lawsuits are an expensive affair (we've checked--in a different but similar setting three years ago, and I doubt it's gotten cheaper). It is time consuming. Even with a judgment in your favor, it would be years before you would even begin to recover your costs (we haven't received enough contributions this year to cover the phone bill). It might take us a while but we would set up under another organization (which you couldn't touch) and start all over again. Our readers are notoriously patient about hearing from us and a lot of them would do everything possible to help a revival, if we decided it was worth the heartache. And any such legal action would sure do wonders for PR with the cowan world, que no? On the other hand, you can invest a nominal amount of time in refuting the letter and giving our readers your side of the story, expend your energies on something more positive, either for yourself or others, find many more pursuits more worthy of your funds (if nothing else, one hell of a party), and certainly things aren't so great for Pagans in this

country and world that we can afford to spend one more iota of our energies FIGHTING EACH OTHER.

Frankly, such in-fighting has caused me to retreat from being a "public" Pagan to a significant degree. How in the name of tarnation are we to present our religion as a positive philosophy if we continue to browbeat each other while blatantly disregarding the same philosophy we are trying to preserve? I continue to maintain that, if anything will bring the downfall of neo-paganism, it will be in-fighting and the resultant actions and reactions. There is absolutely nothing any body or movement can do which is so ultimately destructive of our belief system than the damage we do to ourselves. NOTHING. Think not? What happened to the Puritans?

Okay. off the soapbox. I regret I didn't qualify Runaristi's letter more carefully when published. It's unsubstantiated at this point and should be regarded as such with the burden of proof squarely in Runaristi's corner. I regret the loss of Lady Sabrina's letter and we hope to have something from her soon, if that's her choice.

Certainly. we've all got better things to do. So let's get this cleared up as rapidly as possible and get on with those things.

Book review: Candlelight Spells: The Modern Witch's Book of Spellcasting, Feasting and Natural Healing by Gerina Duniwch. \$6.95 paperback from Citadel (address above). Reviewed by Gerry Nova. This book contains a unique collection of Pagan recipes for Sabbat feasts, esbats and Handfasting, as well as instructions for making incense, potpourri, aphrodisiacs and homemade witch soap. Sections of the book include candle crafting, the making of powerful amulets and talismans, and a brief history of the Old Religion. For those interested in herbalism, there is an informative and useful chapter on old-fashioned herbal remedies for nearly every kind of ailment, a glossary of terms used in herbalism, a list of poisonous plants to avoid, and the names and addresses of many mail order herb dealers who specialize in hard-to-find herbs for both medicinal and magickal use. There is a very interesting chapter on spellcasting which contains an assortment of spells ranging from simple folk magick to medieval witchcraft to ceremonial magick. Students of the occult arts will appreciate the wealth of information found in the "Lexicon of Witchcraft" chapter which is basically a dictionary of both common and uncommon occult words from A to Z. Ms. Dunwich, a self-dedicated Witch from Salem, Massachusetts, presents Witchcraft (Wicca) in a positive light and points out the common misconceptions associated

with the Craft. Her book is an indispensable guide to Wicca (especially for the novice Witch) and is a definite must for all who are into the ways of the Old Religion.

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Book review: Witchcraft, Satanism, and Ritual Crime: Who's Who and What's What. Compiled and edited by Otter Zell. Available from Green Egg, POB 1542, Ukiah, CA 95482. \$2/copy postpaid. (Reviewed by Valerie Voight, National Coordinator, Pagan/Occult/Witchcraft Special Interest Group of Mensa). The purpose of this booklet is to provide comprehensive, basic information to law enforcement officers and other researchers into the topic of ritual crime. It includes an overview of the current hysteria, including some of the valid concerns which sparked it; a history of Satanism; a discussion of the major distinctions between Pagan practices and Satanic ones; the "Principles of Wiccan Belief" as adopted by the Council of American Witches in '74; an article, "Common Themes of Neo-Pagan Religious Orientation", abstracted from the meetings of the ecumenical Council of Themis in '70; a glossary of terms; the Earth Religion Anti-Abuse Resolution with a list of signatories and their addressees; a list of Pagan therapists volunteering services to adult survivors of ritual abuse; a statement by American's leading police investigator of ritualistic crime; statements from Professor Robert Ellwood of USC School of Religion, Dr. Gordon Melton, Director of the Institute for the Study of American Religion, and abuse survivor Joan Christianson; the Cult Danger Evaluation Frame by Isaac Bonewits; a list of resources, consultants, and references; and a page of symbols and their meanings.

As you can see, the booklet is jam packed with useful information for law enforcement, media, and other researchers. What's more, the information is solid stuff--no fillers! Unfortunately, the publishers were strapped for time and space, and so there are a few oversimplifications which I hope will be corrected in future editions. Including:

Some legitimate traditions of Wicca use the horned pentagram, with or without a circle around it, to symbolize the Great Horned God (see, for example, the cover of Gwydion's first album, Songs of the Old Religion--like most Old Fairy

initiates, Gwydion is wearing the horned pentagram). There are even Wiccans who use the horned pentagram with the goat's head;

Many Wiccans also recognize Baphomet as a form of the God, or even as a symbol for the Star Goddess/Ain Soph/etc. In the latter case, he is usually seen as a God of the transcendence of both psychic boundaries and artificial distinctions. It is most unfortunate that Satanists use his name also;

I have never seen Wiccans make any distinction between the two versions of the Sign of the Horns as shown on the back cover of the manual. Also, I was taught to use the vertical Sign of the Horns to bless and the horizontal Sign of the Horns (butting motion) to ward off harm.

These items are important to mention; otherwise an officer could get an inaccurate impression of some Wiccan groups.

While Pan and Dionysos are not, and never have been, evil in the usual abstract sense, they do indeed have their shadowy aspects (not in the sense of being half of a light/shadow duality/but in the sense of being mysterious and awesome, and sometimes fearsome, forces of nature). It was Pan who gave his name to the word "panic". Dionysos, unlike various of the Gods with whom he has been confused or syncretized (e.g., Liber, Bacchos, Bromios, Sabazios, and similar "party-going" gods) was only incidentally the god of wine. His actual domain is the radical alteration of consciousness (including madness), and thus all consciousness-changing substances are sacred to him. Wine happened to be what the Greeks had handy but, in fact, the God does not need substances. In light of this, and in light of the dangers inherent in some of his substances (especially alcohol), I believe he must be considered a shadowy deity. The best standard work on Dionysos is Dionysos, Myth and Cult by Walter F. Otto. The Oxford Classical Dictionary gives overviews of both Pan and Dionysos;

The editors have painted brujos and brujas with an overly wide brush. Some may have incorporated elements of Satanism, but the ones I am aware of have not;

Not all practitioners of magic consider demons to be projects of the human mind:

"Devil" is usually traced to the Greek, not to the Sanskrit (devi);

As many people around the world will assure you, the Evil Eye need not be cast intentionally. Like other psychic actions, it can be unconscious. This is one reason why members of some magical traditions perform routine house (and personal) purification and/or protective rituals as a precautionary measure;

Different traditions have different uses for the word fetch;

It should be made clear that there are many different systems of color correspondences, and that the one in the glossary is not universally used (for example, black is often used for binding, purification, banishing, alchemical work, or to represent the Star Goddess or other transcendent Deities, among other uses);

The loa of Voudoun, like the orishas of Santeria, are sometimes fed animal sacrifices. (Orisha should be in the glossary.);

Some practitioners use the terms "pentagram" and "pentacle" interchangeably. Perhaps the most common usage of those two terms assumes that the pentagram is the abstract symbolic glyph and that the pentacle is a pentagram in three-dimensional form (a disk, a pendant, etc.). Anthropologist (and SIG member) Robert Blew made this observation in the course of his fieldwork;

The hermetic parts of the Qabalah (i.e., the non-Hebrew sections) did not originate in the medieval period but were composed over a period of several hundred years, beginning immediately after Alexander the Great's conquest of Egypt. The Corpus Hermeticum (as the Hermetic parts of the Qabalah are also called) was written by many different writers, mostly of Alexandrian, Greco-Egyptian cultural background;

The definition of "thurgy" given here is close to what many practitioners call (symbolic) "internal alchemy". They would define "theurgy" as magic that focuses on invocation or prayer:

"Warlock" may come from the hypothetical (unattested) Old English "waer-loga", "Oath-breaker", or it may come from the (fully-attested) Old Norse "vard-lokkur", "caller of spirits". (Thanks to Niklas for pointing this out.);

"Wicce" in Anglo-Saxon means "a sorceress". Scholarly English sources usually trace "Witch/wicce" to a Proto-Indo-European word root "weik-", meaning to bend or turn or do magic/religion. Remember, however, that Old English derives in part from Old Danish and all the standard German and Scandinavian scholarly sources trace the Old Danish word "vekka" (sorceress) to the Old Norse word "vitka" (sorceress), and the word "vitka" to the Proto-Indo-European root "wid-" (to see, perceive, know, be wise). (Thanks to Niklas for pointing out the Norse-related material.);

There are at least four different Pagan traditions that call themselves "Fairy" ("Faerie", etc.). One, the Radical Fairies, is not strictly Wiccan and is made up exclusively of gay men. The other three are Wiccan with no special preference given to any particular gender or sexual orientation;

A Working, as the word is commonly used, is usually thaumaturgical but may be theurgical or alchemical;

Last and certainly least, Paul and I should have given Editor Otter Zell clearer information. I'm the National Coordinator of POWSIG, and Paul is the Deputy National Coordinator.

This must seem like an awful lot of criticism; in fact, most of it is just little picky stuff. The booklet, as a whole, is an amazingly information-packed document, and I recommend it to any researcher. Overall, the booklet is excellent and obviously took a prodigious amount of work.

Now law enforcement agencies need not make do with the (mostly) dreck that they have had to rely on until now. Buy a copy and give it to your local Chief of Police, and offer to discuss the information with officers on the force.

Better yet, buy forty or a hundred copies (quantity discounts available) and send them to the police and sheriff's departments of your own and adjacent townships and counties. Send copies to your friends or tell them about the booklet so that they can do the same. The booklet is a not-for-profit community service project, so feel free to send extra money with your order.

And while you're about it, don't forget to thank Otter and Morning Glory for the tremendous service they have done for the Pagan community.

In addition to the Pagan Studies Scholarship/stipend contest, we sponsor a Ring of Truth award. The rules for the Ring of Truth award are as follows: When the 1989 Annual is published, send in your vote for the article of any classification which left you saying, yeah, or maybe even feeling misty-eyed. To cast your ballot, send your check or money order for \$1 to the GNL along with your nomination for the Ring of Truth award winner on the form located in the back of the annual, or a separate piece of paper. If you like, you may designate \$1 of your Annual subscription fee towards the contest prize. You may vote as often as you wish; however, only your first vote will be applicable to your Annual subscription. The winner will be the author of the piece with the greatest number of votes, and in some sense, all of us. Pick your nominees from the 1989 Annual or any issue of the monthly after October 1988. The winner will be announced in the July 1990 monthly, so votes must be cast no later than June 21, 1990.
